Instructions for Communion: All are welcome at the Lord's Table. Baptized Christians, regardless of denomination or age, are invited to receive Holy Communion. The ushers will indicate when it is time for your row to go up the center aisle to to receive. Those in the right-hand line will go to the empty place nearest the right end of the rail, and those in the left-hand line will go to the empty place nearest the center of the rail. When it is time to receive, the priest will place the bread in your hand. If you prefer to receive a blessing, simply cross your arms over your chest. If you choose to receive the bread only and not receive from the chalice, please indicate this by crossing your arms over your chest when the chalice is offered. You may choose to drink from the chalice or by intinction, dipping the bread in the chalice. If accessing the altar platform is difficult for you, you may choose to receive at the standing station in St. George's Chapel, or you may notify an usher, and a member of the clergy will bring communion to you in your seat. Gluten free wafers are available. Please ask the member of the clergy who is distributing communion to you.
