From the Rector

Treading Water? or FORGING AHEAD!

There is a lot of energy and excitement at St. Paul's these days, including...

Huge progress on Children's and Youth Ministries since our June *Ministry Assessment* involving more than 50 parishioners and the creation of a Design Team to strengthen these vital ministries. This is one of the most important initiatives in my six years with you — and its rewards could carry on for a decade or more. The *Ministry Assessment* by a professional team reveals we are severely understaffed for family ministries. More to come on that. In the meantime, our Design Team of parishioners and staff members are reaching out to gather ideas and opinions — in order to reshape and strengthen our ministries with children, youth and families.

Music and the visual arts are in high gear in the *Icons in Transformation* exhibit and in our special worship series and concert series. Be sure to take advantage of these offerings in October and early November — before *Icons* closes. Among the gifts St. Paul's receives from the exhibit are the gift of the new gold leaf and blue cross at the font, and the *Old Testament Trinity* icon in our chancel. More about these gifts in November. (Our portion of proceeds of sale benefit St. Catherine's Shelter for Women and Children.)

St. Catherine's Shelter for Women and Children reopens with an Open House at 12:30 on Sunday, October 27 after a complete renovation. Join us!

Coming up in November: A Syrian-born Episcopal priest, Nadim Nassar, returns to St. Paul's to preach and teach — and to enlighten us on being Christians in a world with confusion about Islam and Judaism. Nadim has lately been at Trinity Wall Street and on Fox News. At St. Paul's he will and teach on All Saints' Sunday, November 3. A special Evensong that afternoon is followed by a fundraising dinner for Nadim's international ministries — see www.awareness-foundation.com and the back cover of this newsletter. The mission of the organization is to empower Christians everywhere to be a counter force of love and peace to the intolerance and aggression that now prevail in so many of our communities. Tickets to the 5:30 social time and dinner begin at \$10 each. Donations in support of the work of the foundation will be accepted at the close of dinner. Interested? The Rev. Zach Drennen of Kenya returns to us in December. He writes this week, "All of us at Elewana Education Project, particularly those who spend time in Nairobi, are coming to terms with what this terrorism means for us and the country where we work. Our efforts in western Kenya to improve schools still continue: with computer labs, scholarships, academic and leadership camps and hopefully service based trips this coming 2014 summer. We will re-double our efforts to be safe in Nairobi while enjoying the rural farming villages and communities in Amagoro. Please keep Kenya in your hearts and minds. Light a candle, say a prayer, or send out your good energy during your next moment of silence."

In late January and early February the Bishop of Aberdeen, Scotland will be with us to lead a quiet day, and to preach and teach the first Sunday morning in February and to be with us for a Candlemas Procession in the late afternoon as we continue to celebrate the Feast of the presentation of our Lord Jesus Christ in the Temple. (All of these internationally known artists and theologians come to us at little or no expense to our Ministry Budget.)

What's on the horizon?

The good news is that the Capital Campaign has made it possible for us to accomplish some essential facilities repairs and made it possible for us to reduce electric and gas use — all without reducing what we have available for our ministries. And, remarkably enough, we have held the church's cost for health care insurance steady for two years and will do so again in 2014. Not many churches or businesses can say that. The other news is that the staff is stretched thin and we've had to make cuts on program expenses since 2007. Next year would be a great time to move forward with expanded ministries for all ages.

You will be hearing more about Faith, Gratitude and Prayer leading to Commitment and Celebration in our all-new Annual Giving Ministry this month. I'm looking forward to it. Watch your mail for exciting opportunities.



Vestry Highlights

At its September meeting, the Vestry was updated on the *Icons in Transformation* exhibit including 30% of sales of works to the ministry of St. Catherine's Shelter, and the request by two parish families that two works, *Door to Paradise* and *Holy Trinity (Old Testament Trinity)* be accepted by the Vestry as gifts to the parish. The Vestry moved to accept gratefully the gifts of both works. A further report will be made in October, and we expect that donations to the exhibit will cover all direct costs.

The Vestry is reviewing a report by Families and Children's Ministries Coordinator Mary Gardner White and Youth Minister Adam Webb which addresses the work to date by the new Design Team and others acting on recommendations developed by the Ministry Architects consultants to enhance and strengthen our ministries for families, children and youth.

Ministry Intern Nathan Bourne of the Diocese of Western NC shared with reflections on his work at St. Paul's with worship and ministries including GreenFaith and *Icons in Transformation*, as well as his ministry with the Sisters of St. Mary, Sewanee, and his ongoing discernment process in his diocese.

The Rector reported to the Vestry on opportunities facing the Parish in the coming months including the development of two models for the 2014 Parish Ministry Budget. Copies of his report are available, as are Minutes of all meetings.

Capital Projects Committee Chair Suzanne Barels reported on the status of a number of projects including additional energy savings features, the installation of railing in the balcony and arches behind the reredos, and reinforcement measures for the reredos and bell tower supports. The Vestry approved the expenditure of \$30,200 from Capital Campaign funds to fund the acquisition of new HVAC controls to reduce energy use and costs, and the installation of an isolation valve to facilitate heating and cooling savings in the Hart (Children's Ministries) Building in particular. Mrs. Barels noted that at its recent meeting the Capital Projects Committee determined that the primary areas of its work in 2014 will be stained glass restoration, roof repairs, and exterior sealing and painting needs as outlined in the case statement for the Capital Campaign.

The Vestry discussed the ongoing unmet need to \$200,000 to \$300,000 annually over the long term to meet effectively the costs of maintaining St. Paul's facilities. There is knowledge now of \$3 million in accumulated capital needs on the horizon.

The Vestry accepted for its review a study of annual pledging and giving in the parish and national trends in communicating within parishes about capital and annual giving ministries. We

benefit from our participation in the Consortium of Endowed Episcopal Parishes (of which the Rector is President this year).

The Rector updated the Vestry on the November visit by The Rev. Nadim Nassar, a Syrian native, Anglican Priest, and Co-Founder and Director of the Awareness Foundation who will teach and preach here on All Saints' Weekend. The Vestry approved St. Paul's serving as the locale for a dinner sponsored by the Awareness Foundation to help raise awareness and financial support for the Foundation's ministry of empowering Christians to be a force for love and peace in the face of intolerance and hostility.

The Vestry heard about projections regarding the anticipated costs of the clergy and staff health insurance plan for 2014 which are expected to remain flat (with a maximum increase not to exceed 6.08%).

The Vestry had a demonstration of the new St. Paul's website and new logo designed by parishioner Carol Robinson and heard about the current status of its development, proprietorship and hosting.

The Rector thanked Amy Thomas for serving as new Chair of the Outreach Committee, and he recognized Sally Durand for her ministry as Chair of that body for the past three years. Outreach Committee is on the agenda for the October Vestry meeting.

Senior Warden Robin Miller reviewed the timeframe of the Vestry Nominating Committee and led a discussion of the possibility of the parish giving consideration to changing the Parish Canons in choosing of Vestry members via a selection process rather than the present election mechanism. The group reviewed possible options under the present election system to encourage parishioners to consider this important ministry and to improve communication about what the Vestry does and how parishioners' gifts and talents are needed in leadership in this and other ministries. Ms. Miller will draft a proposal outlining Vestry selection/election process. The Rector reminded the Vestry that those elected to the Vestry in November will also be elected serve as delegates to the Diocesan Convention in February.

Treasurer Bob Crates offered a report on the parish operating and capital campaign budgets. Revenues are lagging behind expenses in the operating budget, and a deficit of \$62,000 is projected for year end. The capital campaign budget is in excellent shape and it is anticipated that 2014 will begin with a \$100,000 balance in that fund.

Safeguarding God's Children, a course designed to help identify and prevent child abuse, will be offered on September 25. The Rector reminded the Vestry that all Vestry members and others who are in ministry with children and youth in the parish

are required to take the course every three years.

The Rector reflected on his initial six years in ministry at St. Paul's and the necessity of focus on all forms of stewardship, cost controls and other fiscal and physical realities in light of economic challenges. He noted that in the coming months and years the hope is to move forward in other key areas including strengthening children and youth ministries via a *cradle to campus* comprehensive approach to help families.

The Rector named Curate The Rev. Andy Olivo to be Associate Rector. He also explained that he is in dialogue with The Rev. Suzanne Smitherman regarding the appropriate way to reflect in title the scope and foci of her ministries here.

The Rector has been asked by Bishop George Young to invite others to work with him to develop nominations in the Diocese for elections at Diocesan Convention.

Nomination and Election of Vestry Members

A Nominating Committee of Billy Tiller (Chair), Amy Arrowsmith, Kelley Elliott, Rick Lee, Br. Larry Reich, Herb Knowles, Marie Williams Cleary, Mary Lou Sherrill, Mardi Longley, and Joyce Miller is receiving suggestions and will arrive at ten nominees for five openings on the Vestry. Elections are in November. Those elected to serve on the Vestry beginning February 1 will also be among those serving as St. Paul's delegates to the 2014 Diocesan Convention. Please do not seek prior approval from your suggested nominee(s). The Committee has this as part of its process. You may email your suggestions to Robin Miller at rlm@smrw.com.

Completing Vestry terms and not eligible for re-election are members of a strong and gifted class: Senior Warden Robin Miller, Secretary and Clerk Jenny Wright, Hath Harvey, David Padilla, and Br. Larry Reich. Continuing until early 2015 are Lee Culpepper, Lori Govan, Janet Hale, Herb Knowles, and John Woody. Katherine Betts, Junior Warden Rick Lee, Clay Patton, Brad Pope, and Amy Thomas continue serving until 2016. The Rector is Chair of the Vestry, and Hugh Sharber ministers as Chancellor.

All confirmed communicants in good standing of St. Paul's Church who are sixteen (16) years of age or older shall be entitled to vote at the annual Parish meetings and special Parish meetings. All communicants of this Church who for the previous year have been faithful in corporate worship, unless for good cause prevented, and have been faithful in working, praying, and giving for the spread of the Kingdom of God, are to be considered communicants in good standing. (*Canons of St. Paul's Church*)


